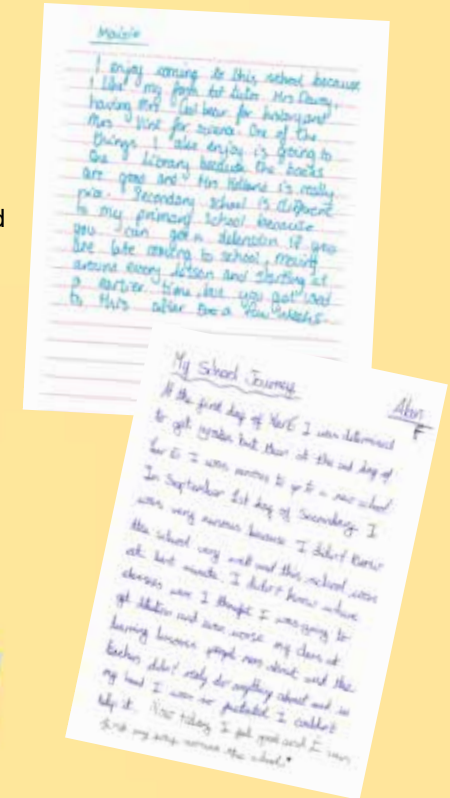


Year 7 Praise Assemblies

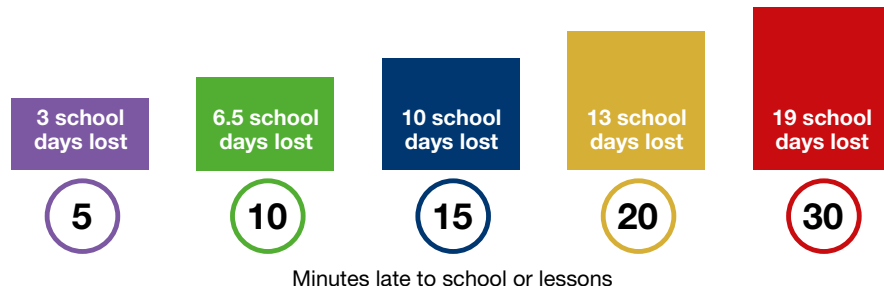

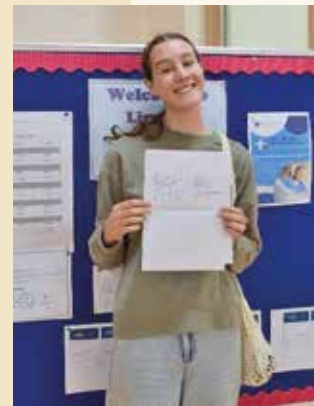

A Level Results

Students at Priory Lincoln Academy have achieved well in their Key Stage 5 studies. A Level results are up on the previous year and in vocational subjects, the achievement is well over 90% merit or distinction.

Their destinations represent the breadth of talent of these young people. University courses range from Medicine and Engineering to Law and Sports Rehabilitation. Continuing the tradition of commitment to the services, two students are joining the RAF. Students are also accessing apprenticeships including Engineering and Electronics. Two students have been accepted to Priory Apprenticeships.

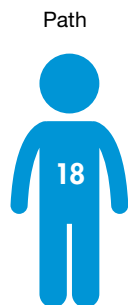

One other website that keeps cropping up in our safeguarding concerns in a platform called Omegle. Its actual tag line is Omegle; talk to strangers! Please ensure you know what websites your children are accessing. There a 'live video chat rooms' which young people are accessing freely and is a huge safeguarding concern.

Officially there is no age restriction on Omegle. If you child uses this – they are at risk.

How to protect young people from social scams

Talk to children about the issue using news stories to start conversations

- When there is a story in the news about the latest online scam then **share this with the whole family** – don't just target young people as anyone can be affected by these things and the more we talk about online issues the more natural and normal it will become!

Encourage young people to check their privacy settings on their social media accounts

- **Most social media platforms and popular apps are public by default**, but most will allow users to control their privacy for example choosing who can see their content or who can contact them. You can find information on how to access these privacy settings here. Once the privacy settings are in place it is still important to remind children and young people to think carefully before sharing too much information.

Encourage young people to be more critical about the ads they see on social media

- Adverts on social media will often look genuine and encourage you to click to visit their website to make a purchase, **it is especially important to make sure that you are on the site that you think you are on**. If in doubt, then browse to the site yourself rather than relying on a link in the advert. Also, have a read of our online critical thinking guide to help young people learn how to make smarter choices online.

If you are in any doubt about whether an offer or a post is genuine then visit the website yourself

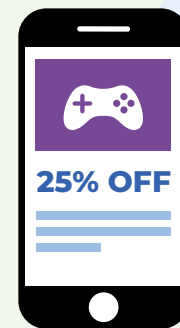
- **Encourage young people not to click on any links in a social media post or email** – type in the address, login if necessary and see whether the offer or claim is indeed genuine.

Reinforce the importance of protecting personal data

- **Remind young people that their bank will NEVER ask them to provide online banking password details** or a One-Time-Passcode if they are using two-factor authentication via an email or social media platform, nor will their bank ever ask them to transfer funds to a safe account or say their money is at risk.

Always report if something looks like a scam

- If you or your children become aware of something that looks suspicious online, then it is important to act. **Report it to the platform** (you can find out how to do that here) and you can also report to Action Fraud. Action Fraud is the UK's national reporting centre for fraud and cybercrime and is the place where we should report scams if we live in England, Wales, or Northern Ireland. In Scotland this can be reported directly to the police.

On Wednesday 13th and Thursday 14th December 2023, students at the Academy were invited to join together for a Christmas Lunch.

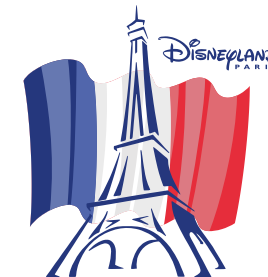

Visit to Bishop Grosseteste University

On Friday 1st December ten Sixth Form students visited BGU for their first ever STEM Day called 'An Introduction to Computing and Mathematics: Artificial Intelligence, Virtual Reality and Beyond'.

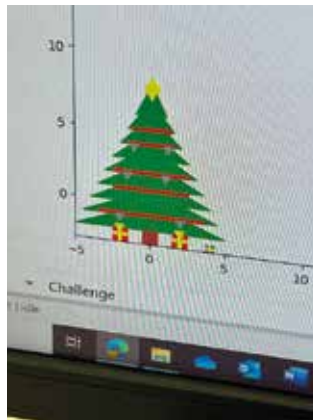
Led by BGU Mathematics programme lead Dr Wahiba Toubal, students explored Core Mathematical techniques including Number Theory, Linear Programming, Probability, Algebra and Pythagoras. They also learnt about modern applications in the field of Artificial Intelligence and how this is used in the health care profession, for example analysing X-ray images.



The interactive hands-on sessions include a Virtual Reality lab experience, and an introduction to Python coding workshop with special guest lecturer Dr Yan Wen, who has completed his PhD in Artificial Intelligence and Machine Learning. Python is a high-level, general-purpose programming language. Again this can be used in the healthcare industry for diagnosing and treating dementia, depression, PTSD and many other conditions and illnesses.

Finally students attempted a series of Mathematics problems to crack a code enabling them to unlock the door out of the escape room.

Students commented that they found the day helpful in their decisions on potential courses when applying for university.



Careers at the Forefront of our Students Development

Lincoln College Experience Day

As part of the academy's careers delivery, a group of yr. 8 students went on a visit to Lincoln College to take part in their Experience Day on Friday 13th October 2023. Students had the opportunity to engage with staff from various departments and learn about technical training, A Levels, apprenticeships, and more.



Each curriculum area also provided an interactive activity to ignite students' interest in future career options. This involved the students trying their hand at plumbing, engineering, and even trying out wearing a police uniform. Students were also able to go on a campus tour visiting the different buildings. Lots of freebies were available to take home including rubber ducks that were awarded to those who successfully completed tasks.

Lincolnshire Health and Careers Event

On Tuesday 7th November 2023, students from Years 10, 12 and 13 with an interest in a potential career in the NHS visited The Lincolnshire Health and Careers Event. This took place in the Engine Shed at the University of Lincoln, the students were also able to experience being in the university campus.



There were over 50 different career stations covering a wide range of professions including Clinical Engineering, Nursing, Dentistry, IT, Plumbing, Corporate Service, Hospice Care, Occupational Therapy, and the Ambulance Service amongst others.

Students had the opportunity to gain an insight into the diverse range of occupations in Health & Care across Lincolnshire. They were also able to view a large variety of skills and career opportunities and speak directly to working professionals about real jobs to explore professions and make informed choices about their future career prospects.

Up and Coming Events

On Thursday 4th July 2024 the academy's careers department will hold their annual Careers Fair. The Careers Fair offers an excellent way for students to learn about what companies have on offer, the different roles available, and gain an understanding of what different jobs entail.

There will also be an opportunity to both hear about and try hands on the skills needed to be successful in today's economy. Exhibitors will include local and international businesses from a broad range of industries alongside recruiters, colleges, universities, and other training providers.

What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

EA SPORTS FC 24

After two decades of holding the official FIFA licence, EA Sports' phenomenally successful football video game series has embarked on a solo run of its own. This season's iteration marks the debut appearance of a new name and branding, but don't let those fool you – EA Sports FC 24 is still a very similar proposition to last year's EA Sports FIFA 23. Popular features such as Ultimate Team remain a big focus, meaning that potentially costly in-game spending is still among the line-up of risks that parents and carers should be aware of.

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

RECURRING RELEASES

EA Sports FC 24 effectively picks up the FIFA template – meaning that after a year, we can expect EA Sports FC 25 to hit the shelves. Updates between versions of the FIFA franchise tended to be minor, but young fans of the game are almost certain to want the new edition in around 12 months' time, so they can keep playing with updated team kits, players and squad lists.

OFFENSIVE VOICE CHAT

FIFA 23 introduced cross-platform play, and EA Sports FC 24 goes a step further with Clubs, Seasons and Ultimate Team cooperative modes across PlayStation 5, Xbox Series X and S, and PC. That's exciting news for youngsters who love to play with friends online – but connecting a much wider audience does potentially open lines of communication between children and far older online gamers.

IN-GAME PURCHASES

In FIFA, Ultimate Team proved to be a profitable innovation for developers Electronic Arts (EA), and is now found in many of their other titles. Players spend in-game currency to recruit better footballers for their team, but this process can take a frustratingly long time – so young fans may be tempted to skip the grind by paying real-world cash to unlock that coveted star midfielder.

Advice for Parents & Carers

ULTIMATE TEAM SCAMMERS

Since the mode was introduced, Ultimate Team has been a target of scammers who attempt to coax players into buying or selling outside the terms of service from EA and console manufacturers. This shady practice can lead to accounts being banned and in-game items being lost. In some cases, young gamers have also been hoodwinked into handing over their payment details to the fraudsters.

POTENTIAL FOR ADDICTION

Just like real-life football, EA Sports FC 24 offers a thrilling, dynamic blend of tactical awareness and skill that fans find absolutely engrossing. Among younger players in particular, this could lead to the identifiers of a gaming disorder as they play on for hours on more game before bedtime or spend practically all weekend playing more matches to earn additional Ultimate Team packs.

DEFEND AGAINST SCAMMERS

EA does contact players via email (although not to ask for usernames or passwords, so watch out for that scam tactic), but never through the game itself – so be wary of incoming messages and consider blocking and reporting suspected spam. Your child should avoid buying coins (the in-game currency) from external sites; it could end with them losing their money and being banned from the game.

AVOID EXTRA TIME

Many parents of young football-orientated gamers worry about their child playing too much EA Sports FC. There's now also a companion mobile app, which can also often provide another indicator that a child is struggling to disengage from the game. You could initiate discussions around set hours of play – or take stronger action by utilising the parental controls on their console or phone.

CELEBRATE THE VARIETY

Ultimate Team may be the game's 'star player', but there's plenty more to go in EA Sports FC 24 including modes which allow access to all of football's big names without needing to spend money on packs to unlock them. This new version of the game includes even more women's teams, marking another step forward in representation, an important subject to discuss and celebrate with children.



SHOW TOXIC CHAT THE RED CARD

Playing EA Sports FC 24 with friends is highly enjoyable, but if competitive types start to turn toxic online, it can ruin everyone's fun. You could occasionally listen in on the voice chat of your child's game for any warning signs that things may be about to boil over. This goes double when playing online with strangers: voice contact with unknown players can be turned off in the game's settings.

CONTROL SPENDING

If your child enjoys Ultimate Team mode, check that your payment details aren't linked to their account. Bundles of FC Points (the game's currency) start at just £1, so multiple payments can easily slip under the radar. You could consider setting your child an in-game allowance, perhaps through a prepaid card, which will help to realise that online spending has a real-world effect.
